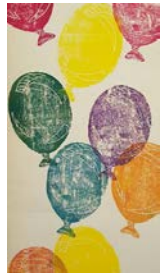

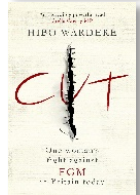

**TRADITION AND TABOO: SILENT WOMEN SPEAK  
A SPEAKERS' EVENING ABOUT FGM**

by Professor Emma Rees, Director of the Institute of Gender Studies, University of Chester, and author of the Vagina: A Literary and Cultural History, Hibo Wardere, FGM survivor and author of the book 'Cut - One Woman's Fight against FGM in Britain Today' and Open Roof Dance Project



Where there's silence, there's taboo. And where there's taboo, there's danger. **Professor Rees** examines these silences, taboos, and dangers, especially as they relate to women and their bodies. Her talk this evening looks at some of these deadly serious issues in an at-times light-hearted, and always informative way.



**Hibo Wardere** will be talking about being a victim of FGM and using her life to fight for dignity and freedom for women.

The dance collective **Open Roof** will be performing segments from the piece *Bedtime Stories*, acknowledging the need for community and attentiveness to each other. *Bedtime Stories* looks at the process of collecting, reliving and sharing your memories with those around you. The piece explores how memories change over time and how the way we choose to tell our stories influences who we are.

by Vanessa Downie of Ajos Dance

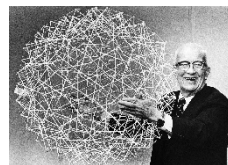

**PAPERMAKING AND LETTERWRITING**

Make paper the traditional way, by hand, using recycled paper, plant fibre and cloth pulp. Prepare to get your hands wet! Paper is made by dipping a mould into a vat of paper and water. The cellulose fibres, attracted to each other, form a sheet, which laid down on a sheet of fabric. There will be dry paper we made earlier so you can finish the session by writing a letter to surprise someone.

**TRADITIONAL WOODCARVING**

The Gypsy wagon (of which there will be one on show) has for hundreds of years been the symbol of Gypsy art and culture. The wagons are carved,

painted and gilded. Traditional carving includes fruit and flowers which are often richly painted. Other parts of the wagons are carved to reduce weight while retaining the strength of the wood.

In this workshop we will look at the continuing tradition of Gypsy carving and try our hand at carving some of the more iconic motifs of in this tradition. We will be using undercutting and a variety of other techniques to build up a carving. The workshop will use soap rather than wood to allow a piece to be completed.

DATING AFTERNOON**

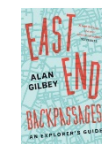
